Thrift stores often offer gently used secondhand items and clothes at discounted prices. It's a win for customers looking for a deal, but thrift stores come with additional benefits.

According to the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics, thrift store jobs are "green." The reuse of items minimizes packaging and the creation of new items from new materials. It also decreases the amount of materials that wind up in landfills.

Plans are for Robin's Home Thrift Store and Donation Center to be open from 11 a.m. to 6 p.m. Tuesday through Saturday in the building that formerly housed Reclamation Brewing.
